Former KCRA staffers, reporter **Kevin Riggs** and photographer/editor **Anita Fein**, have both traveled to Cuba, took plenty of pictures and came back with stories they'll be sharing with us.

Kevin and his wife spent five days in Cuba this past November. He says, "I'll be discussing what motivated me to travel to Cuba, why it's easier to do than many think, what I saw there (good and bad), and why there is such dissatisfaction with the Communist regime."

An Emmy-award-winning reporter, Kevin has been recognized among California's top political journalists during a career that spanned four decades. He has long served as a broadcast political analyst and recently co-authored *The Insider's Guide to Media Training: 99 Tips to Survive Your Interview In The Digital Age.* (Amazon Publishing)

From 1994-2011, Kevin worked for KCRA, serving as a general assignment reporter, anchor and the lead for politics and the state capitol. He was named to the Cal Poly Journalism Department Hall of Fame in 2018. He has been recognized with numerous awards for broadcast excellence, including being part of the KCRA team that was awarded the 2011 Edward R. Murrow Award by the Radio Television Digital News Association for breaking news coverage of the Roseville Galleria fire. He was also awarded a Northern California Emmy for coverage of the Galleria fire.

Kevin recently retired as Senior Vice President for Randle Communications in Sacramento and

continues to consult on media and communications projects.

SFJazz, an organization of jazz lovers and supporters in San Francisco. She says, "The International Cuban Jazz Festival was happening and we attended wonderful concerts every night, and had day trips to music schools, dance academies, jazz clubs and art museums."

A highlight of the trip for Anita, "in addition to the good food and excellent programs," was an afternoon spent with photographer Roberto Salas in his Havana studio. His iconic photos of Castro and Che during the revolution have been published worldwide.

A true broadcast pioneer, Anita paved the way for women in local television news when she became a photographer and editor at KCRA in 1978, a position she held for ten years. Since leaving TV news, she has devoted her talents to fine art photography, making the transition from developing and printing in her home darkroom to digital image capture and Photoshop editing. She has exhibited her work in numerous solo and group shows since the 1970s, and has made many video and slide presentations. She maintains memberships in the National Press Photographers Association and Viewpoint Photographic Art Center here in Sacramento.

She and husband Don got interested in ballroom dancing over 36 years ago, when they watched their wedding video and discovered "we were not naturally gifted." They signed up for lessons and were hooked. That expanded to Lizette teaching at Folsom Lake College where she was the professor of ballroom dancing for eight years as well as teaching private lessons. A typical class at Folsom Lake had 150 students. Don is her favorite partner and they also enjoy combining live local music with ballroom dancing.

And spinning in another direction, Lizette has long loved heritage crafts: sewing, knitting, crochet, spinning yarn, weaving, bobbin lace and tatting. She even spins her own yarn, and keeps two Angora bunnies and silk worms as "suppliers." If you have a mulberry tree, she and her worms would love to





hear from you as they are a great source of worm food. Lizette comes by it naturally. Her grandmother was a pattern maker for Beverly Hills designer Don Loper, whose work was seen in many Hollywood movies. Lizette designed a line of ballroom dancing shoes and a few costumes and convinced the California State Fair to add a handspun yarn category in their annual competitions.

Robert "Bob" Suffel: 1943-2022



Friends and colleagues of VBL member **Robert "Bob" Suffel** gathered at Westminster Presbyterian Church in downtown Sacramento for a celebration of life this past Saturday, Jan. 28.

Bob was a graduate of UCLA who worked as a news producer for KXTV from 1968 to 1969, and then as a state government reporter for McClatchy's Sacramento TV and radio stations, KOVR and KFBK, from 1969 to 1971. His awards included a regional Emmy for spot news reporting, and the California Broadcasters Association for local programming. He then went on to a career as a correspondent for NBC radio news, covering Amsterdam, Beirut and London.

Returning to Sacramento, Bob invested in real estate and worked as a recording engineer. In 1994, he put a low-power TV station, KBTV, on the air. However, the FCC determined that Bob's channel was needed for full-power digital expansion and could not identify an alternative channel for KBTV. After several frustrating years and thousands of dollars in engineering and legal fees, KBTV went dark in 2000.

In his later years, Bob was active in the Sierra chapter of the American Theater Organ Society and played a key role in the production of Westminster Presbyterian's "Music at Noon" program.

Chris Davis: 1954-2022

Former KZAP News Director and one-time VBL member **Chris Davis** died in November while on a Caribbean cruise with his wife, Kathy. A celebration of life will be held on Saturday, Feb. 25, from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Dante Club, 2330 Fair Oaks Blvd., Sacramento.

Chris was a graduate of UC Riverside who began his career at Reno rock station KOZZ. He was ND at Sacramento's legendary alternative rock station KZAP in the 1980s. During that time, he was president of the Sacramento chapter of Radio-TV News Directors Association and of the Sacramento Valley Broadcasters Association.

After leaving broadcast news, Chris went to work for the California Energy Commission, where he was manager of the power plant licensing office.



Barry Fyffe: 1936-2022

Sacramento radio personality and formerVBL member **Barry Fyffe** succumbed to a massive stroke in November in his home in Lubbock, Texas. Barry was a disc jockey at Sacramento's Top 40 powerhouse KROY in the 1970s and then made the transition to talk radio host at KFBK. He was a proud Air Force veteran and a deacon at the First Christian Church in Plainview, Texas. In his retirement years, he enjoyed golfing, horses, and country/western music.

Barry's friends from his Sacramento radio days held a celebration of life on Jan. 15 at the Campus Commons clubhouse.



Barry is survived by Carol, his wife of 42 years, daughters Leslie, Kelly and Amanda, six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.
